People are starting to move from fear to confidence, from isolation to fellowship. We are currently living in the “Little House in the Woods” while we work on remodeling our kitchen and building a closet in our bedroom. How wonderful it is to behold the beauty all around us every day – horses in the pasture; our German Shepherd (thrilled to have us home again); orchids, azaleas and yellow ipê (guayacan) trees in full bloom; mulberry, pitanga (surinam cherry) and yellow plum trees covered with fruit.

DIFFICULT TIMES - The past seven months have been difficult for people all around the world, and Brazil is no exception. Many people have been sick and some have died. During the year we were gone on furlough our congregation in Bateias mourned the loss of six members (none to Covid). Many of our members have been sick with the virus or have family members who were sick. Everyone has felt the effects of not being able to go to church and not having fellowship opportunities in person. Yet, God has been present in every challenge. Everyone has learned new ways of dealing with the difficulties. I think people realize how many Christian privileges they had taken for granted.



Thankfully, we have started having church services once again. But, it's different. We meet with fewer people, wear masks, sit distanced from one another, greet each other without the customary hugs and kisses so much a part of Brazilian culture, and keep the service time down to one hour. Paul and I have been doing many home visits, but we still have not seen everyone. Our elderly members are so thankful for Paul's visits as he brings a devotional, sings a couple of hymns and shares Communion with them. I decided to start up our Tuesday afternoon Ladies' Bible Study group which has been a great blessing to those who participate. Pray for us as we try to reach out and meet needs.

FITTING IN TO THE MINISTRY - In September we met with the local ministry team (Pastors Joel and Fernando) and voiced our desire to be used in ministry as they feel would be most beneficial. At the moment we are in charge of the visitation program and we participate in the regular Sunday services in Bateias and São Braz. As ministries get up and running again, we will fit in where we are needed. Paul has also been cooperating with a ministry to restore drug addicts and alcoholics that was started by Pastor Tom. Although it is located well over an hour from where we live, he has gone weekly to share devotions and converse with the men. He also has been an encouragement to Pastor Tom who has many responsibilities. Besides being the one in charge of the ministry at the Project, he pastors a local church and works as a psychologist (counselor). Pray that these men will discover the grace of Jesus and have their lives transformed eternally.

It seems like we haven't "skipped a beat" as we jumped back into life and ministry in Brazil. Everything went just fine without us, so we know we are not indispensable. Yet, we believe God has a plan to use our lives in ministry in this place in this later season of our lives as we seek to be faithful to the One who called us and to represent you for Jesus' glory in this country.
